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Lent has arrived...Let them eat Cheese!

We have begun our Lenten journey and I am reminded of what this church season was like in my house growing up. First, some background. My father grew up in a Swedish Lutheran church and my mother's family were Scottish Presbyterian. Neither family had a strong religious tradition, though they attended church on the major holidays. After she married my father and I came along, my mother sought out a church close by for my baptism. The neighborhood church where they lived, in an upstairs apartment, at the home of my great-grandparents was Episcopalian and the priest there encouraged my mother to continue her own faith journey for the sake of me. As the years went on, I saw a strong faith grow in my mother. It transformed her from bystander to activist in the church. When my brother was born, we moved to the suburbs outside Philadelphia and my mother sought out a church to attend.

Christ Church "Old Swedes" was founded by Swedish Lutherans and erected in 1760. It was part of the Episcopal Diocese of Pennsylvania when we began attending. My mother slowly emersed herself in the church's life. She joined the women's group and as we got older, taught Sunday school and learned the history of the small church's stained-glass windows so she could give tours to visitors. When women began to take on more leadership positions, my mother was there, serving on the vestry.

My mother eagerly embraced the church's liturgical calendar and sought ways for us (her victims) to celebrate (suffer through) the seasons out-side the church through personal sacrifice. Of course, Lent was the "big kahuna" for my mother. Fasting fit right into the suffer and sacrifice playbook. My Mother thought that suffering and sacrifice, especially when she could include her family, somehow brought her closer to redemption.

For some unknown reason, we always had a non-meat meal day on Friday. It was sometimes a fish course but there were also other options like mac and cheese, meatless lasagna, vegetable soup, well you get the idea. When we had fish, it often came from the kitchen of "Mrs. Paul's". Fresh fish was hard for my mother because she did not have a car and we lived miles from the grocery store. Mrs. Paul's had a limited menu. Fish sticks and crab cakes were often served on "Fish Fridays".

And when the calendar turned to Lent, my mother really kicked into high gear. During Lent, meatless Wednesday found a home on our dietary regiment. This created challenges for the packed school lunches my mother provided for us during those 40 days. Tuna salad and peanut butter and jelly sandwiches were the staple offering, but every so often, cheese sandwiches were discovered buried deep in our lunch bags. These sandwiches contained bread, American cheese and sweet relish. Now individually, I

I don't have a problem with these ingredients, but put together and stored in a hot school locker for several hours, that combination produces a nearly inedible concoction. The relish, added to give the sandwich some flavor, soaks through the bread and the cheese is hot and has lost its natural texture. In short, this found the cafeteria trash can every time.

Cheese sandwiches forced me to begin my Lenten journey by fasting on "Cheese Sandwich" days. By going without lunch, I began to get a better understanding of what it is like to go hungry. Of course, I had a good meal waiting for me at home that evening, and I began to realize how fortunate I was to have other kid things to worry about besides when I would be able to satisfy my hunger. Those of us who do not want for food have no idea what it is like to go hungry and while fasting during Lent is supposed to allow us to focus on Christ's ministry and his journey toward the cross, it is a little hollow when so many "fast" as a way of life.

Going without a meal is an all too real issue in our society today. It saddens me that in a land of plenty, no let's be honest, in a land of excess, there are people who do not have enough food to eat. Children are especially vulnerable as often times adults who control what is bought for the household, use their small amount of cash for things other than food for their children.

It is easy for us to separate ourselves from this issue by rationalizing that our taxes pay for government food programs or by giving ten dollars to world hunger we are doing our part to feed the multitude. In fact, we have a hunger problem right here in Indiana and we should not ignore it. Our recently closed food pantry made a positive impact in the community and the dedicated members of Zion who volunteered each month to manage it were heroes of Zion's outreach ministry. Unfortunately, the food pantry became a victim of pandemic and our aging base of volunteers. We recently donated the remaining funds from the food pantry to other programs in our area. This was the right thing to do and I applaud our council for taking action on this. But is there more we at Zion can do?

Perhaps we can combine our need to fast during Lent, with an effort to make a positive contribution to the food insecurity issue in Indiana County. We can start by giving up one family meal a week and donating the money we would have spent on food to our Indiana area food banks. We could even extend this program throughout the year, providing a regular stream of funds to these vital community programs. We can designate one area food bank each month as recipient of our donation.

I will be asking council to approve this program for Zion at our March meeting. I hope you will find it in your heart to support it.

The following testimony was given by Zion council member Kimberly McCullough at our February Council meeting. Kimberly's words rang especially true for us as we are beginning to explore the book "Power Surge" by Michael W. Foss. "Power Surge" provides a program where churches can change their operational model to one of leadership through discipleship. In the coming months as council and other interested congregation members begin to develop understanding of this new concept, we hope to share more information with you. I thought that Kimberly's testimony was worth sharing with all of you as an example of how we can more deeply share our lives with each other. Thank you, Kimberly, for allowing me to share this with the greater congregation.

On Sunday, I found myself surrounded by several young men (and a few young women) during a Boy Scout Sunday Service at Shelocta Presbyterian Church.

During the sermon, the pastor spoke about all types of love. The one she kept mentioning was Agape Love.

When I was in high school, I was a part of a group of kids who attended a youth event called "Happening" that was held through the Episcopalian Church. For those of us who were on staff, we would have planning events every weekend in Monroeville, then twice a year over a long weekend the "Happening" event would take place at a church around Pittsburgh.

The last dinner, during this Happening Weekend, all of us as a group (both staff and participants) participated in "Agape Dinner". This dinner was put on by the adult volunteers. This is the only time I have heard of the word "Agape". To me, "Agape" just meant a fancy dinner and a closing of an amazing spiritual weekend. We would eat, talk, cry and pray. How naïve I was as a teen (and even know as a young adult) to still not understand the meaning of "Agape".

So when I was listening to this pastor speak of this "Agape Love" to these young children, I not only got hungry for those delicious twice baked potatoes that we would eat at every Happening Agape Dinner, but it made me realize I that I still wasn't sure what the meaning of "Agape" was. This is when I realized I needed to pure my heart into the search of what "Agape Love" truly was for my devotional.

According to Luke 10:27, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind'; and 'Love your neighbor as yourself."

The words "Agape Love" is one of several Greek words that describe love. Agape love is really nothing to do with feelings but rather a motivation to treat others well. When we are walking in "Agape Love" we are walking in sacrificial love. This sacrificial love leads us to voluntarily suffer inconvenience, discomfort, and even death for the benefit of another. By walking in this love, we love without expecting anything in return.

God has directed us to "Agape Love" and directs us to follow Jesus Christ's example.

"Imitate God, therefore, in everything you do, because you are his dear children. Live a life filled with love, following the example of Christ. He loved us and offered himself as a sacrifice for us, a pleasing aroma to God." Ephesians 51-2

God even tells us that it is a commandment for Him.

"A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; as I have loved you, that you also love one another" John 13:34

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I have realized during this process of understanding "Agape Love" that there is a difference between liking and loving and we can show love without liking the other person. Love is respect, and love is kindness. Walking in love is treating others with compassion and having empathy. Love includes forgiveness, whether asked of us or not. "Apape Love" is surrendering, surrendering to God and His commandment to "love one another". In order to love like Christ, we must love with pure sacrifice.

God has called us to love and He also equips us to love. We, as Christians must surrender, must show love to those who hurt us and those who mistreated us.

When we surrender our hurt to God, He will heal our hearts. God will help us to set boundaries with those who we need to set boundaries with and help us to leave situations where we are in danger if we stay.

Let Us Pray:

Father God in Heaven, sometimes it is hard to follow your commandment to love others in the way that You have told us to love one another. We often have allow resentment, bitterness, anger and hurt to get in the way of "Agape Love". Forgive us for not always walking in love and for allowing our emotions to dictate our actions. Lord, help us to love like You have loved. We pray that we are able to see everyone with compassion, empathy, grace and forgiveness. Lord, please help me to demonstrate sacrificial love towards others. We pray that You will heal any wounds that we are still holding onto and that You will set us free from bondage of un-forgiveness. Thank you Father for vastness of Your love for us and for teaching us the power of "Agape Love".

January Minutes: January minutes were reviewed, and a motion to approve the minutes was made by

Gail and seconded by Kevin.

January Financial Report:

January showed an income at \$24,471, which was over budget. In addition \$6,200 was added from Cash Reserve as that was the early giving for 2023. January expenses showed increases to Gas utility, and Elevator. The elevator expense was from the expected annual inspection. Vacation Organist expense was increased due to some late submission of hours.

The O2 Account reorganizations were done and the "Bequest undesignated, Memorials Undesignated, and Other Specials" were combined to be called **Memorial Fund**. \$22,940

An "In/Out" O2 line created for funds for short term projects.

Budget Surplus O2 account now includes monies from Special Focus envelope 2020 and Budget Surplus 2022. \$25,895

Kevin proposed that council looks at investing some of the monies that are not tied up for immediate use within the next year into a CD or two. The interest rates for those are higher now than the S&T savings account. Ryan from the ELCA Foundation will be talking to Zion Council about the ELCA Foundation account at the next council meeting. It did show a decrease in 2022.

A Motion was made by Gail, and second by Kevin that the January financials be filed for audit.

Old Business:

Fish Estate- There is work in process to get the release of some of the estate funds, while leaving an amount to cover the fees being disputed by the previous Estate Attorney.

Window Project- Because of the delay in releasing the estate funds, we missed the Jan 31, 2023 deadline for a 3% discount.

Kitchen Project Contract – This is also being pushed to a later due to the estate funds.

On-line Project - All materials are here.

New Business:

Sue has learned that the AED's battery is low and will need to be replaced. This unit is now 12 years old and also out of the 8 yr. warranty. Sue has not been able to order replacement batteries because they have been on a worldwide back order for over a year with no date for shipping. With the age of the unit it might be better to look for a new AED. Sue will look into getting a new AED.

WORSHIP & MUSIIC COMMITTEE MINUTES

Topics Discussed:

- 1. The committee discussed cleaning the brass altar items (candelabra, altar candle stands) and set a date of March 14, 2023 at 10:00 AM for assembling volunteers to clean these valuable Zion assets.
- 2.The committee heard from Dr. Clewell concerning the need to add voices for 2 upcoming services (April 2nd Passion Sunday and April 30) so that music options could be expanded. The committee recommends that the money be appropriated for two male voices each Sunday at a cost of \$150.00 each.
- 3. The committee also heard from Dr. Clewell on her request to add a soloist for Zion's Easter Sunday service at a cost of \$100.00. The committee approved this expense.
- 4.The committee also heard from Dr. Clewell of her plan to relocate IUP's Martin Ott Portatif (a portable organ instrument) to Zion during the Kney organ rehabilitation project. The loan of the IUP instrument will be free to Zion. However, Zion will be responsible for the relocation costs both to Zion and returning to IUP after the Kney project is completed.
- 5. The committee heard from Dr. Clewell that Dave Keith will again be singing the two liturgical items during the Easter vigil. The committee was happy to hear that Dave will again be adding his very fine voice to the service.
- 6.Dr. Clewell also announced that the choir will be chanting the Psalms at this year's Maundy Thursday service.
- 7. The committee set the times for our Lent and Easter services.
