Christ is Risen! Hallelujah!

We will be deep into Holy Week when this newsletter arrives in your mail box. As we commemorate the most holy of days in our ecclesiastic calendar, we will progress from the sorrow of Maundy Thursday and Good Friday to the Joy of Easter and Jesus' triumph over death and the grave. Easter marks the return to singing "Hallelujah!" again. Our Lenten journey was void of this joyful praise of God and we welcome it back with enthusiasm.

Handel's "Messiah" is probably what we think of first when it comes to Easter and "Hallelujah!". Who doesn't get chills when hearing this chorus sung?

Sometimes I don't think we "Hallelujah!" enough. All that we have is a blessing from God. Our whole life and even our ransomed life from death and the grave are freely given to us through the grace of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Easter allows us to really focus on this as we sing Hallelujah in praise and thanksgiving.

I looked into the meaning of "Hallelujah" and found that Hallelujah is actually a two part phrase in Hebrew that means "praise ye Jah!" The first part "hallel" in Hebrew means a "joyous praise in song". The second part, "Yah" is the shortened form of YHWH (Yahweh in modern English). Hallelujah is found in 24 verses in the book of Psalms, starting and concluding several of the Psalms.

But "Hallelujah" has also made its way into modern secular use as well.

Kathy and I recently watched a documentary on Leonard Cohen. Cohen was a Canadian poet and song writer who composed "Hallelujah". It was originally recorded in 1984 on an album called "Various Positions". Columbia records, which published Cohen's recordings at the time, refused to release the album stating that it wasn't good enough to be released. An independent record label released the album and in 1991 John Cale of the Velvet Underground re-recorded "Hallelujah" and its popularity skyrocketed.

Since then the song has become one of the most performed songs in modern music history. It has appeared as background music for television (The West Wing) and featured in the animated movie, "Shrek".

Cohen took five years to write Hallelujah, composing 80 to 180 verses for the song. When asked as to the meaning of the lyrics Cohen wrote:

"This world is full of conflicts and full of things that cannot be reconciled. But there are moments when we can reconcile and embrace the whole mess, and that's what I mean by "Hallelujah".



As I navigate through my third year in leading this congregation, I can sure identify with that statement.

Conflict and things that cannot be reconciled are part of us. We have it in relationships with family, with friends and neighbors, with local and national politics, and within our church life. Life sure is messy and more and more we find that there are very few instances where we can have a "Hallelujah" moment.

In our confirmation class this month we are studying the Ten Commandments. God's Ten Commandments are all about relationships. Commandments 1-3 focus on our relationship with God. Commandments 4-10 focus on our relationships with each other. I think that Jesus summarized these Commandments perfectly when he said: "Love God with all your heart and mind and soul and love each other as you love yourselves." Of course, our daily lives often hinder us as conflict and chaos (Satan) constantly work to distract, divide and discourage us.

We open each church council meeting with prayer, reminding us that with God's help we will honor our rich traditions while welcoming new ideas. We recognize that we come from diverse backgrounds but we will strive to resolve conflict with fairness and respect toward each other in the best interests of our congregation.

I admit that this doesn't always happen. But we return each month and try our best. I am always encouraged at the end of the meeting when we all sing the doxology together.

"Praise God through whom all blessings flow;

Praise Him all creatures here below;

Praise Him above ye heavenly host;

Praise Father, Son and Holy Ghost! Amen.

Zion has its conflicts and we have some issues that may not ever be reconciled, but when we do join together, those moments deserve a big "Hallelujah!"

I hope as the year progresses, we will find more of those moments. I for one would welcome them.

Christ is Risen! Hallelujah!

He is Risen Indeed! Hallelujah!

The Kney

The centerpiece of our worship life at Zion is in need of refurbishing. The Kney organ has served Zion for over 40 years, providing us with a majestic accompaniment to our hymns and inspirational music during our prelude, postlude, offertory, and choir anthems. We have also been the recipient of concerts and special music as area musicians were eager to play or accompany the Kney with their music skills.

We are at a crossroads now as we must decide whether or not to shoulder the financial burden of refurbishing the Kney. Our congregation has lost much in the last few years. Membership is down. This creates issues for our leadership as we manage church finances with declining funding. Our membership has been generous to Zion's financial needs but frankly we continue to struggle with budget essentials. Fortunately, we have recently received significant gifts that have allowed us to address some long-neglected building issues. It is easy to get discouraged about us and our future. But Zion will carry on as there are still faithful people here. Our recent interest is creating a disciple- based community of worship at Zion, gives us hope that Christ is alive at Zion and we can continue to be an active oasis of faith in Indiana PA.

But the having the Kney, at Zion goes way beyond the walls of our nave.

Our Director of Music, Dr. Christine Clewell, recently provided some insight into the significance of having the Kney organ at Zion.

"For the four major principles of stewardship in preserving Zion's storied Gabriel Kney Organ, I write.

- 1. Music Ministry Outreach and Evangelism to the community between 1978 since its installation and Lent 2010 (and beyond), at least 50 non Zion members have attended faculty and guest organ concerts with internationally acclaimed organ artists: Martha Folts (year of the Dedicatory Recital); Drs. Marilyn Mason (before and in 2000 and 2011), Ann Labounsky (2x); Margaret Evans (2009); Christoph Kegenhoff, Guy Whatley, Libby Larsen and at least three International Festivals of Women Composers; local AGO chapter events with regional organists have performed at least five events since 2017, and most recently since Sept. 2022 with the Patriot's Day program.
- 2. Music Ministry and Outreach and Evangelism to the IUP students since 1978 to present day with at least three student organ-related events per year up to March 1, 2020. This is a modest number—it is likely that 100 people per year have collectively attended these events, which include the Advent and Lenten Organ Recitals followed by soup and fellowship drew more non-Zion members into the church than members.
- 3. Preserving the Lutheran heritage and tradition of our sung faith and its distinct role in theological history where congregation singing is carried by a pipe organ since the 1600's.
- 4. Zion's Gabriel Kney Organ provides organ instruction for students and non-students where musically aesthetic inspiration of both extrinsic and intrinsic value serves the rural, western PA region...where both the IUP faculty, IUP organ and music alumni, and non-organ students of the university are reached throughout this region. Since 1978, Zion has established itself as a historically significant venue where people gather to hear great music, secular and sacred music, in a remarkable space that is unparalleled east of Pittsburgh and west of Harrisburg. Zion possesses an impactful identify serving the role of patron of the arts to a rural region where organists gather for instruction and inspiration.

Our congregation should measure its worth and impact by those within and beyond its walls...to serve our Lord, Jesus Christ by sharing the powerful role that music plays in nurturing the souls of the masses and preaching the healing power of the Gospel through music with many voices gathered in profound ways with organ music at the helm".

The old saying: "You don't know what you have it until you lose it" certainly applies to us when it comes to the Kney organ. Our congregational forefathers had the vision to invest in this exceptional musical instrument. They bore a large financial responsibility to ensure that Zion would have the best musical experience possible. Zion's membership back then, steeped deeply in both instrumental and vocal music, joyfully shared their talents in praising God every Sunday and the Kney provided the ultimate accompaniment for them.

As we assemble on Sunday today, there is no doubt that we are no longer the congregation we were when the Kney was first installed. And while our choir is small, it is faithful and powerfully supported by the Kney. Can we really imagine worship without this glorious instrument?

We have recently invested in better building access options for us to use when entering Zion. We have improved the look and functionality of our social hall and we will begin in 2023 to address upgrading our kitchen and the building's exterior windows. Refurbishing the Kney will provide encouragement that we are here to stay and that the Kney will continue to provide inspirational music for future Zion congregations.

We will be meeting on **Sunday April 30, 2023** after services to discuss the Kney's future at Zion. Please plan to attend this meeting to share your voice and vote with your fellow congregation members.

Special Congregational Meeting

Zion's council has announced that a special meeting of the congregation will be held on **Sunday April 30, 2023**.

The Kney, installed at Zion over 40 years ago, has been the center piece of our music program providing Zion's members with a rich and inspirational accompaniment to our worship experience. The quality of the Kney has allowed Zion to attract top tier organists to both provide music for our services and provide community outreach through sharing their gifts through concerts and instruction to aspiring organ students.

In consultation with Brunner and Associates LLC, our Kney maintenance firm, it has been determined that the instrument requires three areas of refurbishment.

- 1. Organ Chassis: Dismantling and transporting the Kney for proper restoration of organ and delivery and reinstallation \$86,256.94
- 2. Rebuilding the Kney's wind regulators \$7,350.00
- 3. Restoration of the Kney's combination action \$41,893.50

The restoration work would begin in 2025, which is the earliest available time that Brunner can schedule the work due to current backlogs. The time estimated for the project to be completed is five months.

The total cost of the renovation, if we contract the work by May 31, 2023 is \$127,500.44. This is an \$8,000.00 discount from the above costs of \$135,500.44.

The congregation is being asked to approve proceeding with the refurbishment and allow council to organize a three-year fund-raising campaign to help raise out-of-budget funds to offset the cost of the refurbishment.

A secondary item of the agenda will ask the congregation to rescind its previous approval of replacing the roof on the nave. Recent repair and sealing of the existing roof on the nave have added approximately five more years to the roof's life. Council would like to hold those funds designated for the roof replacement and invest them in secure best available interest rate products.

Financial Report January 2023- January showed an income of \$24,471, which was over budget. In addition \$6,200 of early giving for 2023 was added (Cash reserve). January expenses showed increases in Utilities (Gas), and Elevator. The elevator expense was from the annual inspection. Vacation Organist expense was higher than usual due to some late submission of hours from 2022.

The O2 Account reorganizations were done, and the "Bequest undesignated, Memorials Undesignated, and Other Specials" were combined to be called **Memorial Fund**. \$22,940

An "In/Out" O2 line was created for funds for short term projects.

Budget Surplus O2 account now includes monies from Special Focus envelope 2020 and Budget Surplus in 2022. \$25,895

A motion was made by Shirley and seconded by Kim that the January financial report be filed for audit.

Committee Reports

Kevin proposed to council to move some of the monies in our S&T savings account that are not tied up for immediate use, to a one year CD for a better interest rate. A motion was made by Sue and second by Kim to move \$75,000 from S&T savings to a CD.

Ryan from the ELCA Foundation presented updates about the ELCA Foundation Endowment fund. Zion's account did decrease this last year, but he stated that we received approximately \$1,200 in interest earnings. Ryan also stated that he would be willing to talk to the congregation about Legacy Giving.

Leadership through Discipleship

The following testimony is from Zion council member Dory Campbell as we continue to explore the book "Power Surge" by Michael W. Foss. "Power Surge" provides a program where by churches can change their operational model to one of leadership through discipleship. In the coming months as council and other interested congregation members begin to develop understanding of this new concept, we hope to share more information with you. Dory's testimony is another example of how we can more deeply share our lives with each other. Thank you, Dory, for sharing this with the greater congregation.

At a recent Council meeting, members decided to share with the congregation how each of us attempts to include devotions in our lives, hoping to encourage others to talk about their practice. We know that everyone approaches this habit in different ways. No ONE way is the only way.

So, this is my story. For years I have intermittently read a small devotional book, Christ in Our Home. (Copies are on the window sills in the sanctuary for anyone who would like to check them out). I was very busy with kids and work. It was hard to find a quiet moment. When I did, I appreciated that these were short and thought provoking. And best of all, Thursday through Sunday the readings and commentary prepared me for weekends' worship times.

In the 90's I worked for an employer who invited us to share our daily scriptures and prayer concerns each morning. This helped me to get in a more regular routine of reading Bible verses and praying for my family and friends. Then, when I began to care for my mother in her last years, she kept a journal where she wrote her prayers down each morning. I felt I was too busy to do that. But over time I began to add that on mornings when I could. It was an amazing adventure. It has shown me over time how God is answering my prayers – not always as I expect, but of course, as is best. It has really helped my trust/faith to grow. And it has helped me pay attention and often spot God's hand at work in life's situations. I record daily "gratitudes" and "God-sightings" along with my prayers now. That, too, helps me to recognize how blessed I am, even on the worst days.

I look forward to learning how others find God in their daily lives. The conversations will enrich us all, to be sure.

ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE COMMITTEE MINUTES March 8, 2022

Financial Report:

February financials are still in process.

Synod Benevolence Increase- We have received a letter from the Synod concerning our benevolence giving. They are asking congregations in the Synod to aspire to increase their benevolence to the Synod to 20% of their total Current and Benevolence. Currently we give \$24,000 per year. We would need to increase what we give by \$7,000 if we wanted to reach the 20% level. Discussion followed. There was concern about a sudden increase in the level. A suggestion was made to increase giving by half to \$3,500. This will be taken to council.

O2 account review and reorganization. – A \$75,000 CD was purchased at 4.25%. The money was from the savings account and also some from the checking account. This allows for much better interest earnings while the money is not immediately needed.

Old Business:

Fish estate has not been received yet, so window and kitchen projects are still on hold.

New Business:

Organ repair- Bruner Company from Silver Spring, Pa has drawn up a proposal to Zion for repairs of the Kney Organ. There is much to be repaired/refurbished, and repairs could be divided into 3 phases. Bruner recommends that the 3 phases be done at the same time with an \$8,000 savings. Total proposal is for \$135,544 but this proposal is only good till the end of May. This company is scheduling into 2025. Much discussion on how to raise funds for this, options for organ use during repairs, and how and when to approach the congregation for funds. A notice for a special meeting would need to be posted in time to meet the proposal expiration date. This will be brought to council next week.

Motion made to adjourn at 7 pm in time for the mid-week Lentin service by Rik, and second by Kim.
