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MEMORIAL DAY

Prayer – A daily activity worth doing

Prayer has always been a big part of my life. I guess I can thank my mother for that. You see, she took very seriously the pledges she made at my baptism. Early in my childhood, the Lord's prayer was recited a lot. In addition, I was exposed to a lot of corporate praying. You know the kind of praying I mean. We all do this type of praying each week during the prayers for intercession. We hear topical prayers designed to fit the scripture for that day as we ask for God's help with changing our hearts to be better stewards of our earth and better neighbors to each other. We also pray for those who work in vocations that heal and protect us and for those who have gone before us to God's loving embrace. There is even a space for us to add individual intercessions, but I rarely hear myself or anyone else offer anything. Perhaps this is because we are embarrassed to mention any need we have in our lives or we fear we don't have the skill to present our petition in the right format. Either way, I wish we were comfortable with each other enough to have more of that personal touch in our corporate prayer life. Perhaps our continuing study in the "Power Surge" discipleship process will provide us with the tools to add those personal prayers into our corporate settings.

My mother was big on private prayer too. She often found that seeking God through prayer helped to calm her anxiety with a problem or relationship and opened her mind to finding solutions to problems or patience in dealing with difficult situations. She said many times that asking God for help instead of asking God to fix, left it to her to solve a problem or alter a situation. You see she believed that she was a "free will" child of God. God is the creator, but God is not the manipulator. God has left it for her to live her own life and God, when asked, would provide through the Holy Spirit, the tools she needed. Of course, she already had those tools, but she just needed encouragement to use them.

When we moved to the suburbs we joined a small congregation in Swedesboro, Christ's Church Old Swedes. This congregation became our home. It was a congregation with a rich Swedish Lutheran history that now belonged to the Episcopal diocese of Pennsylvania. Its roots pre-date the revolutionary war and we found that the congregation, though small, was full of faithful people who shared our (my mother's) faith values.

Growing up in the city, my mother never needed to have a driver's license. When we moved to the suburbs, learning to drive became a necessity for her. My parents bought a 1958 nine passenger Mercury station wagon so that mom could navigate through the suburbs to church, school and grocery stores. So, mom needed that license to make her suburban life work. I remember the day my mother went for her driver's exam. Back then the test was given by PA state troopers at a special driving course. My dad

was at work so one of the neighbors agreed to take my mom for the exam. Our neighbor had four small children and our three made seven. We all piled into our new station wagon, no seatbelts or car seats back then, and went to the test track. I could tell that mom was nervous about navigating this behemoth through the course. I am sure she silently asked for God's intervention as she entered the torture chamber that was the driving test course. We all climbed out of the car and took our places on a hill beside the course. Our neighbor had brought a bag of penny candy along and we were all sitting on the bank of the test track watching the action like Roman citizens watching lions and Christians in the coliseum. My mother did fine until the dreaded three-point turn, which she could not navigate in the long station wagon (no power steering either). The trooper looked over at all of us sitting on the bank, cheering my mother on, and said to her, "Are those your kids?" And my mother said, "Yes they are". Now technically, only three belonged to her, but the trooper failed to follow up so she left him with the impression that we all belonged to her. He stated "Lady you really need this license so I'm going to pass you." Perhaps my mother prayed, asking the Holy Spirit to change the heart of that State Trooper so that he might see no real danger to putting my mother behind the wheel of that station wagon! Or perhaps my mother plotted to present the most sympathetic atmosphere toward that examiner to give her an edge for a successful result. Either way, she got that license.

The simple act of praying is one activity that, over the years, has been a part of me. I, by nature, am a planner and need order in my life. Yet often times I am thrust into situations that are disorganized chaos. The anxiety this creates for me is overwhelming at times and asking God to help me find patience in these situations usually, but not always, helps. Kathy and I have recently been dealing with her early Alzheimer's diagnosis. The uncertainty. and sometimes the chaos that exists in our lives today can really stretch the limits of one's (my) patience. Kathy started an infusion therapy two years ago that is designed to slow the progression of the decease. The results of this therapy are hard to judge as we do not know if things have progressed slower than they would have without the therapy. While Kathy's cognitive test scores have remained relatively constant, I have noticed that her short-term memory is declining. This is where the prayer for patience comes in. I have to constantly remind myself that I need to be calm and patient in reacting to Kathy's memory loss. I reassure her that her condition is not her fault and that I am now here to fill in the gaps for her so that she does not feel anxious or frightened as she cannot remember events and conversations that took place only 30 seconds past.

I began to accompany her on her visits to our homebound congregation members. We have a great deal of fun taking the Eucharist to our Zion shut-ins. These folks are anxious for news from the church and grateful for our visits but we get even more out of this ministry than they realize, because it provides Kathy with a chance to interact with people other than me. Since she has been a Eucharistic minister for a very long time, the service is still fresh in her long-term memory and she performs the service flawless-ly.

We are grateful that we can still provide some service to Zion and we constantly pray that we can continue to do so. Our current situation has shown the value of prayer in helping us through the normal everyday life we now live.

I truly believe that God, through the Holy Spirit, is always there to help in small and quiet ways. We just have to seek the help we need. My mother didn't need the Delaware river to part so she could cross to New Jersey but she did need that driver's license. As we continue to pray, let us thank God for the Holy Spirit's presence in our lives.

Zion's First Quarter Financial Report

We got off to a strong start in 2023 as our current and benevolence contributions totaled \$59,391.80. This total included \$53,391.80 contributed in the calendar year 2023 and \$6,200 that was pre-contributed in 2022 for our 2023 budget year.

Our total contributions through 3/31/2023 (all income categories) totaled \$61,356.76. This was 39.64% of our 2023 income budget.

Thank you all!

Our total expenses for the first quarter of 2023 were \$46.166.78. This was 29.82% of our budgeted expenses. Our first quarter expenses included higher than expected utility costs, higher than expected maintenance costs for the elevator, and higher than expected costs for building repairs.

The building repairs line item included costs to repair the stone steps entering the church from the South Sixth Street-Church Street location and the re-plastering of the walls at the main entrance to the nave that sustained damage due to our water leak that has since been repaired.

Zion council also voted to increase our contribution to the Northwest PA Synod from \$24,000 to \$30,000. This was in response to the Synod's request that all member churches strive to contribute 20% of their projected annual income for Synodical and National church program support. Zion's original Synod benevolence contribution of \$24,000 was 15.5% of our budget projected income. Our revised Synod contribution raised that contribution percentage to \$19.4%

As of 3/31/2023, we had first quarter budget surplus of \$15,189.98

Administration and Finance acted to take advantage of increased CD rates and moved \$75,000 to an S&T Bank 1 year CD paying annual interest at 4.25%. The funds Invested contained \$19,000 from the Endowment Fund, \$19,022 from the Steinway Piano Restoration Fund (which is a dedicated account that has had no activity for many years), \$6,102 from the Youth Gathering Fund (a dedicated account with funds for the 2024 Youth gathering) and \$30,876 from our operating cash fund (this left a balance of \$124,009 in that fund). Our money market annual interest rate is 0.012%. This move will generate an additional \$2,287 in interest for budget year 2023.

Zion Continues its Food Pantry Support

While we no longer have a Food Pantry to distribute food to our area neighbors who are in need, we can still help with Indiana's food insecurity by contributing to the other local food pantries who are still working hard to ease hunger in our area.

Zion's council has endorsed this effort. Those of us at Zion who still wish to contribute to help feeding our neighbors in need, can do so by donating each month to "Food Pantry". We will combine our month-ly "Food Pantry" offering and then distribute it to one of our local food banks.

You can support this program by sending your contribution along with your regular Zion offering. Please make the dollar amount you wish to contribute to "Food Pantry" by marking that amount in the "Food Pantry" box on your contribution envelope.

We will select a different food bank each month and send our collected monthly contributions to that food bank.

The Kney Organ Refurbishment Project

The centerpiece of our worship life at Zion is in need of refurbishing. The Kney organ has served Zion for over 40 years, providing us with a majestic accompaniment to our hymns and inspirational music during our prelude, postlude, offertory, and choir anthems. We have also been the recipient of concerts and special music as area musicians were eager to play or accompany the Kney with their music skills.

We are at a crossroads now as we must decide whether or not to shoulder the financial burden of refurbishing the Kney. Our congregation has lost much in the last few years. Membership is down. This creates issues for our leadership as we manage church finances with declining funding. Our membership has been generous to Zion's financial needs but frankly we continue to struggle with budget essentials. Fortunately, we have recently received significant gifts that have allowed us to address some longneglected building issues. It is easy to get discouraged about us and our future. But Zion will carry on as there are still faithful people here. Our recent interest is creating a disciple- based community of worship at Zion, gives us hope that Christ is alive at Zion and we can continue to be an active oasis of faith in Indiana PA.

But the having the Kney, at Zion goes way beyond the walls of our nave.

Our Director of Music, Dr. Christine Clewell, recently provided some insight into the significance of having the Kney organ at Zion.

"For the four major principles of stewardship in preserving Zion's storied Gabriel Kney Organ, I write.

1. Music Ministry Outreach and Evangelism to the community between 1978 since its installation and Lent 2010 (and beyond), at least 50 non Zion members have attended faculty and guest organ concerts with internationally acclaimed organ artists: Martha Folts (year of the Dedicatory Recital); Drs. Marilyn Mason (before and in 2000 and 2011), Ann Labounsky (2x); Margaret Evans (2009); Christoph Kegenhoff, Guy Whatley, Libby Larsen and at least three International Festivals of Women Composers; local AGO chapter events with regional organists have performed at least five events since 2017, and most recently since Sept. 2022 with the Patriot's Day program.

2. Music Ministry and Outreach and Evangelism to the IUP students since 1978 to present day with at least three student organ-related events per year up to March 1, 2020. This is a modest number—it is likely that 100 people per year have collectively attended these events, which include the Advent and Lenten Organ Recitals followed by soup and fellowship drew more non-Zion members into the church than members.

3. Preserving the Lutheran heritage and tradition of our sung faith and its distinct role in theological history where congregation singing is carried by a pipe organ since the 1600's.

4. Zion's Gabriel Kney Organ provides organ instruction for students and non-students where musically aesthetic inspiration of both extrinsic and intrinsic value serves the rural, western PA region...where both the IUP faculty, IUP organ and music alumni, and non-organ students of the university are reached throughout this region. Since 1978, Zion has established itself as a historically significant venue where people gather to hear great music, secular and sacred music, in a remarkable space that is unparalleled east of Pittsburgh and west of Harrisburg. Zion possesses an impactful identify serving the role of patron of the arts to a rural region where organists gather for instruction and inspiration.

Our congregation should measure its worth and impact by those within and beyond its walls...to serve our Lord, Jesus Christ by sharing the powerful role that music plays in nurturing the souls of the masses and preaching the healing power of the Gospel through music with many voices gathered in profound ways with organ music at the helm".

The old saying: "You don't know what you have it until you lose it" certainly applies to us when it comes to the Kney organ. Our congregational forefathers had the vision to invest in this exceptional musical instrument. They bore a large financial responsibility to ensure that Zion would have the best musical experience possible. Zion's membership back then, steeped deeply in both instrumental and vocal music, joyfully shared their talents in praising God every Sunday and the Kney provided the ultimate accompaniment for them.

As we assemble on Sunday, there is no doubt that we are no longer the congregation we were when the Kney was first installed. And while our choir is small, it is faithful and powerfully supported by the Kney. Can we really imagine worship without this glorious instrument?

We have recently invested in better building access options for us to use when entering Zion. We have improved the look and functionality of our social hall and we will begin in 2023 to address upgrading our kitchen and the building's exterior windows. Refurbishing the Kney will provide encouragement that we are here to stay and that the Kney will continue to provide inspirational music for future Zion congregations.

MINUTES OF THE CONGREGATIONAL COUNCIL

March 13, 2023

Call to Order: 6:35 pm.

Devotions: Kim's devotions told of some interesting information on St. Patrick and his work to bring the Lord's word to those in Ireland. A prayer was said noting Pastor Tedd's 10th Ordination Anniversary on March 17.

February Minutes: Name correction. Motion to approve by Rik and second by Kim.

Communications:

Pastors Report- none

Facebook/Web site- Dory has sent some suggestions to clarify items on the Website to Christoph.

Financial Report-

February Current and Benevolence was above budget. Some increased expenses above monthly budget were Gas utility, Phone, and Devotional materials. YTD expenses were slightly above budget. A \$75,000 CD was purchased from S&T at 4.20%, (due 2/20/24).

A motion was made by Dory and seconded by Kim to accept financial report and file for audit.

Committee Reports-

Administration and Finance- Kevin

<u>Synod Benevolence Increase</u>- We have received a letter from the Synod concerning our benevolence giving. Synod is asking congregations to aspire to increase their benevolence giving to 20% of their annual total current and benevolence giving. In 2022 we gave \$24,000 (\$2,000/month) which was 12.7% of our 2022 total Current and Benevolence giving of \$188,804. Some expressed concern about us having a sudden increase. Based on our 2022 C&B giving, if we raised our Benevolence by \$6,000 for a total of \$30,000 this year that would work out to 15.9%. That would be an additional \$500/month. Motion made by Becky and seconded by Kim that we increase Benevolence giving this year to \$30,000.

<u>O2 account review and reorganization</u>. – A \$75,000 CD was purchased from S&T with a 4.25% interest. The money was from the savings account and extra from the checking account. This allows for much better interest earnings while the money is not immediately needed.

Property - Becky Slade

The cement steps at the Church St. corner door have been leveled and fixed. Work will continue to repair a patch on the garage roof where shingles were blown off.

Rec and Fellowship – Shirley

The committee met to come up with some funeral menu options that would be more doable with the small volunteers we have available. The options have been printed, and a copy to go into the file for what to do when a funeral is planned. It is hoped that if plans are being made that Shirley gets contacted, along with the committee to see if a funeral luncheon is feasible with the staffing available.

Social Ministry - Sue

The two freezers have been donated, and moved to Chevy Chase Community Center and Creekside United Methodist Church Food Pantry. They are BOTH very appreciative of the generous donation from Zion Lutheran Church.

There is still excess food sitting in the Food Pantry with most of it now passed Best By date. What is usable will be distributed to pantries.

"Pass the Cheese please" – Zion would still like to continue support of Food Pantries in the area and will start a program of Food for Indiana monthly giving project. Information will be announced each month in the newsletter for donations to be collected for a different Food Pantry each month.

Old Business-

Sue has purchased a new AED but was recently informed the 4-6 wk backorder is now 10-12 weeks. The current AED still has a charge.

New Business-

Organ refurbishment- The Bruner Company from Silver Spring, Pa has drawn up a proposal to Zion for repairs of the Kney Organ. (Copy of the proposal given to Council) There is much to be repaired, and Bruner recommends that the 3 phases/projects be done at the same time with an \$8,000 savings. Total proposal is for \$135,544 but this proposal is only good till the end of May. This company is now scheduling into 2025. This work would take approximately 3-5 months if done all at once, so the organ would only need removed once. A 10% down payment would be needed at contract signing, (\$12,750) and remaining payments at start, midway and end of repairs. Much discussion on how to raise funds for this, options for organ use during repairs, and how and when to approach the congregation for funds. A notice for a special Congregational meeting will be planned for Sunday April 30, 2023. Letters to announce the meeting will go out to the congregation.

No further business, meeting adjourned at 8:04 pm

The following testimony was given by Zion council member Becky Slade at our March Council meeting. Becky's words rang especially true for us as we continue to explore the book "Power Surge" by Michael W. Foss. "Power Surge" provides a program that teaches churches how to change their operational model to one of leadership through discipleship. In the coming months as council and other interested congregation members begin to develop understanding of this new concept, we hope to share more information with you. Becky's testimony as part of our council meeting devotions, was worth sharing with all of you as an example of how we can more deeply share our lives with each other. Thank you, Becky, for sharing this with the greater congregation.

An Emphasis on Touch

We have the ability to touch - and to perceive touch. Our skin is the largest sensory organ of the body. Physical touch immediately answers many questions. Touch tells us the temperature, texture, and is it wet or dry? Feeling makes us human and that's why we say "touching" to many things. We hear and are touched by music, or words in a book. We are touched by the impact of seeing something visual in art or nature. The simple act of some ones kindness is "touching." Maybe a comforting hug or a hand on our arm, a call, a text, or a card in the mail. We say, "We are in touch with, or I've fallen out of touch.

How do we keep in touch with God?

The Creation of Adam by Michelangelo painted in the Sistine Chapel depicts God giving Adam the spark of life. Quite often shown in pictures as only their hands, index fingers nearly touching. Viewing a picture of the entire fresco they are definitely reaching out to each other with their arms fully extended hands almost touching.

We read through out the Old Testament how God communicated by talking directly to Adam, Noah, Moses, Abraham, and others. God sometimes sent an angel to deliver his message. At other times the Lord delivered his message in a dream.

Touching.

We can only assume that Mary and Joseph given the great responsibility of raising God's Son, touched Him, caring for Him, swaddling Him in loving kindness and meeting His needs as He grew.

Touching.

When Jesus began his ministry delivering God's message to the people, He had the ability to physically touch them. When Peter began to sink while walking on the water, Jesus reached out and caught his hand.

Touching.

Jesus blessed the children by putting his arms around them and laying his hands on them.

Touching.

Jesus healed many the blind, the lame, and those crippled with many infirmities by touching them. He touched the unclean. When the woman with the hemorrhage touched His robe, Jesus was immediately aware that power had gone from Him. He asked, "Who touched my clothes?" The woman extended her hand and by faith was healed. Jesus in turn knelt and washed the feet of his disciples.

Touching.

Jesus gave us a new commandment that we love one another. A reminder to reach out in love. We celebrate the Sacrament of Holy Communion in this meal the bread and wine are His body and blood shed for us.

When the elements are consecrated they are touched. Receiving communion we reach out and touch the bread and with our hands the cup of wine. When we eat this bread and wine touch our hands, lips, and mouth becoming part of our body. Jesus as bread and wine touches us. The bread (body) and wine (blood) which we consume consumes us to make us more like Jesus.

Lead by the Holy Spirit let us reach out with the light of Christ that is in us to touch one another. We can strengthen this by incorporating the Marks of Discipleship from the book Power Surge into our daily lives.

1. Pray daily A daily devotional is a good beginning. At our house we subscribe to three that we use. Two are from Guideposts, Mornings with Jesus and All God's Creatures. The third is The Word in Season from Augsburg Press. We recently added a fourth Christ In Our Home available on the windowsills at Zion, through the generosity of one of our members.

Touching.

Just a few minutes everyday dedicated to reading scripture, praying, meditating, and being still. I'm connected by group text to my sister in Virginia and my sister-in-law in Colorado. In addition to keeping up with family news, we pray for each other and share our daily devotions. We are in touch by text. 2. Worship weekly In person or online. If you've fallen out of touch, welcome back Zion is reaching out.

3. Read the Bible This one is easy if you don't already, hopefully it's part of the daily devotions you've just added to your day.

4. Serve at and beyond Zion Lutheran Church Our lives and the lives of our children have been enriched by the interactions we have had within this congregation.

Touching.

5. Be in a relationship to encourage spiritual growth in others. Give of my time talent and resources. In the devotional Mornings With Jesus every day has a Faith Step encouraging the reader to do more to reach out. Remember it's God's Work and Our Hands. Please keep in touch.

Holy Spirit, prompt us to share our faith, time, talents, and move us to do good works. Open the eyes of our hearts to recognize the needs of our neighbors and to touch the world with your love. Amen

Financial Report: Financial report presented for March.

C & B income was above budget about \$1,000 and put the total for the year so far at 39% of the annual budget. Expenses: The Synod benevolence amount was increased to the \$2,500 per month as voted on at the March 2023 Council meeting. Church repair expenses included Masonry charges for plaster repair in the 6th street entranceway and repair to the church street entrance steps. There were charges also for repairs to the garage roof. YTD expenses are at 29.8% of budget where target is 25%.

Old Business:

Fish estate- The check has been deposited into the money market. An O2 account line has been created titled - Estate Memorial Fund. Again per our constitution 10% must go to endowment fund. The estate check was for \$506,000, so \$50,600 must go to endowment. Kevin showed a plan to invest some of the estate money in a high interest 5yr CD (5.1%). It would contain some of the fish estate, and undesignated extra operating cash.

New Business:

The Worship and Music committee is looking into repair or replacing the altar candelabra and torches. When they were preparing for the Easter services we found that there was a lot of wear and tear of the torches. The brass is almost all worn off. They are also looking into replacing some Albs for the Assisting Ministers. These are ideas of some things that could be funded by the Undesignated Memorial funds (\$22,600 balance).

The AED is still on back order. Caroline Anderson has offered to pay for it in memory of her husband Pastor Anderson. Sue will contact Caroline and discuss arrangements. The AED is still on back order and no charge yet.

Meeting was adjourned at 7:45 pm.

CREATION-FRIENDLY END OF LIFE INTERMENT

There are currently two main methods for caring for the dead which use renewable natural resources, reduce our carbon footprint, and restore and preserve habitat.

GREEN BURIAL, often called NATURAL BURIAL involves no vaults or grave liners. The body is not embalmed. Containers used are made of natural or plantbased readily biodegradable materials. The body is buried at 3.5'-4' deep, with an 18" smell barrier. Natural burial is legal in most states, including PA, NY and OH. The nearest green burial certified funeral home is Burton Funeral Home in Erie (burtonfuneralhome.com) For further info, go to <u>Greenburialcouncil.org</u>

NATURAL ORGANIC REDUCTION (HUMAN COMPOSTING) is a relatively new burial alternative in which a person's remains are turned into usable soil. This involves placing the body in a special container and surrounded with natural materials like wood chips and alfalfa. Decomposition takes about a month, with the human remains broken down gradually into a nutrient-dense soil mixture, resulting in about a cubic yard compost. Non-organic matter like dental implants are sorted out, and then loved ones can take the entire result for use in a backyard garden or forest.

Human composting saves about 1.2 metric tons of carbon compared to traditional burial methods. The cost is usually more expensive than direct cremation but cheaper than traditional burial. It currently is legal in New York, Colorado, Vermont, California, Washington and Oregon, but additional states are considering it.
