Father's Day, Birthday, and D-Day

As June approaches, I always think of my Father. June is a big month for remembering Kenneth Huston. Not only is it the month of Father's Day, but my dad's birthday also falls on June 20th. June is also the anniversary of D-Day. D-Day marked the beginning of the Allies entry onto the European continent in the final push to defeat Nazi Germany. You could say that my dad was on the tip of the spear of this effort.

Dad joined the navy in January 1943 at age seventeen. He was assigned to an LST (Landing Ship Tank). Dad's LST was built in Pittsburgh PA. He joined the crew of that ship and sailed it down the Ohio and Mississippi rivers to New Orleans. In New Orleans the ship added its compliment of assault boats. The Higgins boat, manufactured by the first integrated work force in New Orleans and named for its designer, was the main vehicle used to put infantry into the war as they landed on the beaches of Normandy France.

Dad was assigned to a three-man crew responsible for navigating the choppy English Channel and getting its compliment of twenty-four men onto dry land. Dad was in the third wave and arrived on the beach at 6:30 AM on June 6, 1944. He was 18 years old.

Underwater obstacles, placed by the Germans to prevent such landings, impaled my dad's Higgins boat and all had to abandon ship to wade onto the beach. That included dad and his other crew mates. They became stranded on the beach for the rest of the day. All were under orders not to go out into the surf to assist any of the landing infantry. In essence everyone was on his own in trying to get ashore safely.

I often wonder what kind of thoughts one has about life in those moments. I am sure that dad's war experience shaped his focus on life that day. Facing one's mortality in such a way has to bring real clarity to your life. I am sure that dad was not thinking about those around him and wondering about their race, their faith, their politics, or their sexuality. Rather, he was counting on the character of those other teenagers on the beach to help him get through that day alive. My dad was somehow wounded on June 6, 1944. I know this because I have his purple heart medal, though he never spoke of the circumstances surrounding that event. In fact, dad rarely talked at all about his experiences during the war. The first time I even knew he was at D-Day was on the 25th anniversary of the invasion when a local newspaper contacted him for comment.

But, looking back on my dad's life, I believe that he learned something about our relationships with others that day. From the comfort of our own modern existence, and away from confronting life and death situations on a daily basis, we are often too quick to judge others. We categorize people into groups based on their religion, politics, race

or sex. If they don't fit into what is acceptable in our group, they are people to be feared or worse, shunned. This is the harsh reality of life today. We seek out and embrace sameness because we are afraid to rejoice in the diversity of God's world. Our fear prevents us from having a fuller and richer life on God's earth.

My dad was not a reader but one of his favorite phrases was "Don't judge a book by its cover". And he practiced what he preached. All through his life, dad had many friends and acquaintances who were not part of his "group". This was especially out of the norm during the 1950's but dad always saw beyond the outside and found the inner sameness in people. His love of people for who they were inside and not by how they looked on the outside was the best legacy I could ever hope to receive.

Though a Lutheran by birth, dad was not "religious". My mother was always the driving force in this area, but they made a terrific life lesson team. My parents lived Jesus' commandment to "Love others as they would want to be loved". That simple message was front and center in my parents' life, and by association my life. Although I freely admit that I have been challenged at times to live up to their example. It is hard to live with life's diversity. No, it is more than just hard, it is frightening to do so. But the rewards you get for being courageous in living Christ's commandment is well worth the effort. Throughout my growing up, people of all types were part of my life experience. This provided me with a rich variety of cultures and ideas to build on as I grew up. My life has certainly been much richer because of my parents' example.

Thank you, dad for your service to our country and for your life's lessons. For better or worse, I am who I am because of you.

Fish Estate Gifts Zion

The estate of former Zion member Mardelle Fish has gifted Zion Lutheran Church the sum of \$506,477.95.

This generous gift from Mardelle will be put to good use as Zion has several property projects that can benefit from the financial resources of this gift.

Zion will first invest \$51,000 into our Endowment Fund. This is accordance with our constitutional requirements.

Part of the gift will be used to support our final ZARP project, the renovation of the kitchen. (\$58,918.09). This project and its budget amount had been approved by Zion's congregation at a special meeting called in July 2022. The project is scheduled to get underway in late May and should take one month to complete.

Part of the gift will be used to provide replacement windows for section A of our building's window project. (\$189,930.00) This project and its budget amount was approved by Zion's congregation at a special meeting called in July 2022. The windows scheduled for replacement will be those on the west side of the structure encompassing the office area, Sunday School area, Pre-School location and the windows facing east at the pastor's office location and the third-floor area currently housing our archives storage. This project is scheduled to begin in early fsll 2023.

The Administration and Finance Committee has approved investing \$200,000 from the Fish Estate Gift into a 12 month CD at 1st Summit Bank with an annual interest rate of 4.85% (the endowment fund amount of \$51,000 was also added to this CD investment). This investment has been made in anticipation of providing financial support to Zion's roof, should replacement be required in the next five years.

Interest from the CD will provide an additional \$9,700 to our capital projects fund and \$2,473.50 to our Endowment Fund.

The remaining \$6,629.86 will be left in Zion's capital projects 02 account to cover any cost overruns that should arise from the kitchen or window projects.

Remembering Helen Myers

The Helen Myers Memorial Fund was established in 2021, through contributions from Paul Myers and the Myers children, to provide funding opportunities to enhance Zion's music program.

A continuing resolution was passed by Zion Council to formalize the **Helen Myers Memorial Fund** to:

- 1. Underwrite special music and/or concerts performed at Zion in memory of Helen Myers
- 2. Underwrite church music scholarships for organ students

Since then, Helen's love of music and devotion to Zion Lutheran Church in Indiana PA, has been enhanced by using these music and scholarship programs to add voice to our weekly service music.

While contributions to fund the Helen Myers Memorial Fund have come primarily from the Myers family, other sources within the congregation and the community have been slow to materialize.

The Helen Myers Memorial Fund committee is appealing to the congregation to consider supporting, through personal contributions, this fund so that the music we have all enjoyed these last few years can continue.

Give this some thought. We hope you will add this fund to your generous support of Zion.

Refurbishment of the Kney Organ

Zion Lutheran held a special congregational meeting on April 30, 2023 to discuss engaging in a refurbishment project for our Kney Organ. The congregation present voted unanimously to move forward with the project. The Kney has served our congregation for over 40 years and is one of the finest organ instruments in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Our initial investment in the Kney has provided us with several accomplished keyboardists who have served as both Director of Music and Organist. In addition, the Kney has hosted concerts showcasing the talents of several accomplished musicians while serving as the primary instrument for instructing future organ musicians in IUP's music program.

We have received bids from both Brunner and Associates LLC (our current maintenance provider) and J. Zamberlan & Co (our original maintenance provider). At the congregational meeting, the congregation approved a working budget not to exceed \$130,000 for the refurbishment project. J. Zamberlan & Co. has been awarded the project and work will begin in late Summer 2023.

The decision, made decades ago, to add the Kney as our main accompaniment instrument for our liturgy, was made to ensure that Zion would be able to provide quality church music for our congregation and offer, through its music, a rich variety of evangelical outreach to our community.

Over the years, the Kney has had numerous repairs, keeping the instrument in good working order so that its music mission could be accomplished. These repairs addressed most of the ongoing issues of functionality with the organ, but there was no doubt that a major refurbishment was in the Kney's future to bring the organ back to its original operational condition.

That time is now upon us.

The Kney refurbishment committee under the direction of Dr. Christine Clewell, our Director of Music and Organist, will be tasked to negotiate the specific operations to be undertaken and the time line for completion of the project.

We now need to ask that you support our efforts with the Kney by considering a pledge over the next three years to provide the funds necessary for the successful completion of the project. You will soon be receiving a mailing asking your support, through contributions, to this project. Our hope is that we can raise the funds over the next three years to cover the cost of the Kney's refurbishment.

We will continue to update you on the progress of the project through the newsletter.

We sincerely hope that you support us as we move forward with restoring the Kney to its original glory.

ELECTRIC VEHICLES: THE FUTURE

Upfront, the best advice we can provide about electric vehicles (EV) is to read an overview article, such as one published by Consumer Reports (CR) in February, 2023. Much of the following information is obtained from that article.

EVs are part of attempts to reduce climate change. The decision to purchase is complicated for many reasons, but well worth the effort.

In general, EVs still cost more in dollars than comparable fossil fuel (FF) vehicles. That price difference is shrinking. One question to ask is whether the dollars alone tell the story. What price do we put on saving the earth? Saving lives affected or lost due to climate change is just as important.

Following are some of the factors to consider regarding EVs.

Reliability: "A 2020 CR study found that EVs cut repair and maintenance costs by 50 percent over similar gas cars."

Fuel savings (including cost of electricity for charging):" The cost of the electricity to charge an EV is almost always hundreds of dollars less per year than the fuel expense for a similar gas-powered vehicle."

Tax credits by federal and state government: Depending on price, point of manufacture, and income of the buyer, credits of up to \$7,500; used EVs can also get a tax credit of up to \$4,000.

Rebates: In addition to federal tax credits, EV buyers can potentially save thousands thanks to state tax breaks for car buyers, lower electric rates for EV owners to charge at home at certain times, or discounts on installing an at-home charger.

Private industry offers: examples include "a \$500 rebate from a utility company if consumers buy or lease their car from a local dealership; a \$600; rebate and discounted electric rates depending on which charger they buy and when they plug in.

The range (miles) per full charge: even large vehicles are now achieving ranges greater than 300 miles.

Yes, it is a rather complex combination of factors — if you make cost the only criteria. Our challenge is to look beyond the cost in dollars to see how much is saved in terms of the health of all creation: humans, animals, plants, air, water — every thing!

ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE COMMITTEE MINUTES May 3, 2023

The meeting was called to order at 7:02 PM

The minutes from the previous month's meeting were reviewed and approved as written (Wissinger/Bowersox).

The Financial report ending April 30, 2023 was reviewed and sent for audit (Bowersox/Wissinger)

The committee was informed by chair Huston that a 12-month CD will be obtained on Thursday, May 4, 2023 in the amount of \$51,000 from proceeds from the Fish estate, as mandated by Zions constitution (Revised 2020). The annual interest rate for the CD is 4.85%.

The committee was informed that the Kitchen project, approved by the congregation on July 2022, has been executed with Pennington Construction. Project start dates and schedules will be released as soon as received by Pennington.

The committee was informed that the window project, approved by the congregation in July 2022, had an increase of some \$50,000 due to inflation and supply issues during the last 10 months. The project proposal will be reviewed with the vendor to reduce the number of windows replaced so that the project can be undertaken within the budget parameters approved by the congregation.

The committee discussed the two bids received for the Kney Organ refurbishment project. Zamberlan and Co.'s bid of \$140,416.00 is being recommended for acceptance by council based on the ability of Zamberlan to begin the project in the summer of 2023. The other bidder (Brunner) is unable to begin the project until 2025.

With no further business to discuss the meeting was adjourned at 8:05 PM.

- **3.**Window replacement contract will be signed and deposit paid to allow phase "A" of Zion's window upgrade project to get underway. Anticipated availability for the windows to be installed will be in early Fall. A project completion schedule will be published.
- **4.**Council has voted to delay the Nave roof replacement project, approved by the congregation. After recent repairs to the nave roof, council is delaying the project to improve Zion's future cash flow.
- **5.**Russ Crane is providing plastering services for the Church Street door entrance and the stairwell leading up to the choir loft.
- **6.** Ron Lukehart Home Specialists has completed the work to replace the garage roof with asphalt shingles.
- 7. The committee is seeking vendors to repair parts of the sidewalk that could create a tripping issue.
- **8.**The committee is seeking vendors to bid on a new church sign at Church and Sixth Streets.
- **9.**Becky Slade has agreed to spearhead finding a landscape architect to create a plan for the green space on the south side of the church.

2023 Projects

1.The committee will explore creating a Columbarium in our new green space area. This would be a designated space to allow for a final resting place for ashes.
