How's Your "Love Thy Neighbor" Batting Average

As most of you know, I am a huge baseball fan. My Mother (her again) was a major influence on my baseball passion. When her father died, my six-year-old mother was watched over by two of her great-uncles, William and Locke. In addition to being confirmed bachelors, they were baseball fans. Back in depression era Philadelphia, fans had a choice between the American League Athletics and the National League Phillies. The A's were owned and managed by Connie Mack and at the time of my mother's birth had won nine league pennants and five world championships. The hapless Phillies, often embroiled in ownership shenanigans and near bankruptcy, had won a total of one pennant and no world titles. So, of course, great-uncles William and Locke were avid Phillies fans.

Baseball is a game of failure, fair play, and statistics. The greatest hitters in any age often fail seven out of ten times. No matter how great you are as a player, you must wait, batting only once while eight other players take their turn. Statistics, and there are plenty of those, allow players and their fans to measure their careers against the greatest of their age and those great stars of the past. Statistics are compiled and compared allowing all to be judged with the worthiest enshrined as baseball immortals. Baseball is also the only sport in which the defense has the ball, but we can address that sometime in the future.

If a player is to survive as a professional baseball player, he needs to face his failures head on and have the courage to keep trying. This is tough on anyone's ego, but on top of that, ball players have to live with their failures before thousands of people in the stadiums where they perform.

In our own lives we too often have to face failure. While most of our failures are not so public as those by ball players, they are no less painful for us to experience. In our faith lives, our failures come from our inability to truly love God and our disregard the needs of our neighbors. I sure hope God isn't keeping score on our "good deeds" batting average. Yea, I get it, we are saved by God's grace alone, not through our own good works. But why then did Jesus give us this commandment: "Love God with all your heart and soul and mind and love your neighbor as I have loved you." It sure seems like Jesus is giving us the mother of all good deed commandments.

While teaching confirmation class this year, I have given a lot of thought to Jesus' commandment. Condensing the ten commandments into those simple words, is fraught with opportunity for us to fail. God's grace sure comes in handy daily in our lives doesn't it. Loving God with all your heart and soul and mind, seems a like a small request and one that should be easy to fulfill. But let a little cloudiness into our lives and God often bears the brunt of our anger, sadness and disappointment. How easy it is for us to lash out at God when life just doesn't go right. I know this all too well as we are facing the toughest challenge of our lives right now, trying to hang on to the Kathy we know, while watching who she was slowly slip away.

Loving your neighbors as Jesus has loved us should be a breeze. Until we really dig into who our neighbors truly are. Let's start with family. While technically not our neighbors since we had no real choice in selecting them, family is a mixed bag for all of us. We say we love them, but they frustrate, anger and disappoint us as we do them. Friends should be easy right, since we get to pick them ourselves. But who has a long list of life-long friends that are trustworthy, compassionate, and loyal to a fault. I know my list is very small. And how about that broader interpretation of neighbor that Jesus lays on us. When asked the question, "Who is our neighbor?" Jesus listed the hungry that we should feed, the sick who we should minister back to health, the naked who we should cloth and the lonely who we should visit. This is especially tough when these neighbors don't measure up to our standards. How easy it is for us to turn our backs on neighbors who don't worship God like us, don't look like us, don't think like us, and don't have the same life style as us. You bet it is hard to love these neighbors. I know that I have failed often trying to live this simple commandment from Jesus.

But just like those ball players, we need to have courage in the face of failure to keep trying. God may not be keeping score on us, after all we are indeed saved by God's grace alone! But just like my mother's uncles, God knows he is a fan of a team fraught with shenanigans, moral bankruptcy, and failure, yet when we win that one lone pennant, won't that be truly something! God has been pulling for us since the beginning. Let's have the courage, in the face of all life's failure to keep trying.

Start small. Reach out to your neighbors at Zion, you'll be surprised the next time you see your batting average in the box scores.

First Half Budget Update

Zion ended the first half of 2023 with a \$19,405.59 budget surplus. Our income as of June 30, 2023 was \$109, 201.16 (70.54% of budget projections) and our expenses as of June 30, 2023 were \$89,795.57 (58.01% of budget projections).

On the income side, those who made budget pledges (44 families) to our current and benevolence for 2023 contributed \$77,247.60 through June 30, 2023. This was 55.5 % of the total pledged amount. In addition, we had contributions to current and benevolence. from 44 additional families totaling \$22,187.00. The balance of our first half budget income came from miscellaneous contributions.

On the expense side, a slight increase in budget expenses came from our adjustment to Synod benevolence contributions (Zion council voted to increase our benevolence contributions from \$24,000 to \$30,000) and unexpected utilities (Gas) costs, elevator maintenance, and property repairs (garage roof, side walk and entry step repair). This pushed these two budget categories beyond the estimated 50% threshold with Synod benevolence at 62.5% of budget and property at 79.25% of budget.

We are currently invested in two Certificates of Deposit which we hope will provide us with \$12,080.00 in additional annual interest income for our general budget needs and \$5,010.00 in additional Mission Endowment growth. These are small but significant steps forward as we look toward calling a ministry intern sometime in 2024.

Council will begin work on our 2024 budget in the coming months. If you have questions or suggestions on areas where our budget can be improved, please seek out a council member and share your thoughts.

Zion Continues its Food Pantry Support

While we no longer have a Food Pantry to distribute food to our area neighbors who are in need, we can still help with Indiana's food insecurity by contributing to the other local food pantries who are still working hard to ease hunger in our area.

Zion's council has endorsed this effort. Those of us at Zion who still wish to contribute to help feeding our neighbors in need, can do so by donating each month to "Food Pantry". We will combine our monthly "Food Pantry" offering and then distribute it to one of our local food banks.

You can support this program by sending your contribution along with your regular Zion offering. Please make the dollar amount you wish to contribute to "Food Pantry" by marking that amount in the "Food Pantry" box on your contribution envelope.

We will select a different food bank each month and send our collected monthly contributions to that food bank.

Kney Refurbishment Project Update

We are underway on two fronts with the Kney refurbishment project.

Our pledge campaign has received 21 responses with financial commitment to the project totaling \$65,310.00. This is 50.2% of our total approved budget of \$130,000.00. Our pledge campaign has an end date of July 31, 2023. If you have not yet pledged, there is still time to do so. A reminder that we extended the payment terms to three years, so you can commit your support and have until 2025 to fulfill your pledge.

Our refurbishment company J Zamberlan and Co. have removed those parts of the Kney needing off-site work. We have received, on lone, an organ from IUP which we will use until the Kney refurbishment is complete.

We are currently anticipating a November completion date for this project.

Sight and Sound Trip A Success

On Thursday July 13, 2023, members of our congregation traveled to Lancaster PA to the Sight and Sound Theatre to attend a production of "Moses".

The production was as promised; a sight and sound extravaganza with music, visual effects, live animals, amazing sets and a great bible story that kept the audience spellbound.

Current Projects

- 6.7/3/2023 Bid for new outdoor sign received
- 7.7/18/2023 Miller Plumbing repaired a toilet and urnal that had been leaking causing increased cost to our water bill
- 8.7/18/2023 Elevator semi-annual inspection was performed

On Going Projects:

- 1.The committee received a bid of \$11,200.00 to resolve the bat infestation problem at Zion. This will entail capturing and removal of the bats to a new out of town location and sealing all areas susceptible to pest incursion. Council reviewed this bid and asked the committee to revisit this with the vendor for clarification on several issues
- **2.**Pennington Construction continues to make progress on the kitchen renovation project. New ceiling, walls and flooring have been installed along with new electrical and lighting. Project is on schedule.
- **3.**Window replacement contract was signed and deposit paid to allow phase "A" of Zion's window upgrade project to get underway. Anticipated availability for the windows to be installed will be in early Fall. A project completion schedule will be published.
- **4.**A landscape architect has been contacted for assistance in designing our greenspace landscaping. In addition we are looking into adding a columbarium within the design.
