As Simon Peter blurt- ed out "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God" (Matthew 16:16) when Jesus asked the disciples who they say that Jesus is. That phrase, "Son of the living God" is important to us as Christians, and I think we do not spend enough time focusing on it. We proclaim Jesus as the crucified son of God, but we do not really explore or discuss how God is living, in our midst.
		In one of our sessions for our <i>Love, Wins</i> discussion, we watched one of the <i>Nooma</i> videos by the same author of the book, Rob Bell. These videos were created between 2002 and 2009 and the pronunciation is the same as the Greek work pneuma meaning wind or spirit or breath. As we inhale and exhale, as we breathe, we are reminded of the spirit of God given to creation. We bless each other by breathing, by exchanging 'peace' with each other.
		The Spirit of God flows through our congregations, with our interactions, bless- ing us as we too proclaim Jesus is the long-awaited and much anticipated Mes- siah, the Son of the living God in, with, and around us! Divine revelation brought the understanding to Peter which enabled him to proclaim the identity of Jesus, and for us, our Holy Baptism brings us to an awareness.
		As we are anticipating the return of the Gabriel Kney organ this year, we have some exciting plans in the works—more information to come on this in upcoming newsletters. We have also been working on the upgrade to our streaming capa-

bilities. Yes, these have been delayed, but the work has continued.



A hope that I have for Zion is to take a look at the stated Mission for the Congregation and begin to review it. I hope that Luther Chapel will begin to draft a mission statement during this time, as well. Zion's Mission reads: "God calls us into a community in Christ to gather for worship; share the good news; reach out in love and service to our world using the gifts God gives us; and support one another in our ministries." It is a fine statement, but when asked about a mission statement, it took some time for individuals to remember that it existed and we had to search to find it. Kney Organ Refurbishment Update

As we close the books on July 2023, I would like to update you on where we stand with the fund -raising campaign for the Kney organ refurbishment.

As of July 31, 2023, we have received 24 pledges totaling \$79,110.00. This is 60.8% of our funding goal of \$130,000.

If you have misplaced or have forgotten to send in your pledge, please know that we will be glad to accept it at any time in the future.

Those of you who wish to support the Kney organ refurbishment project but are unable to make a pledge commitment can do so by sending in your donation with your regular weekly envelopes. Just mark the "Other" box on your envelope with the amount and write "KNEY" under the amount you wish to contribute.

Repairs on the Kney are currently progressing off-site. We are hoping to have the Kney ready for worship in early December 2023.

We will continue to update you each month on our progress.

"Building for the Future Campaign" Announced by Lutherlyn

Our congregation received communication from Lutherlyn in July announcing their campaign "Building for the Future". The campaign has a goal of \$2,500,000 (\$1,500,000 of which has already been raised) to address the future needs of the facility.

Lutherlyn has a goal of funding five professionally constructed "winterized" cabins at a cost of \$1,000,000, the renovation of the Steininger Memorial Amphitheater at a cost \$500,000, the removal of the outdated and unusable Shaulis Cabins along with road and site improvements at a cost of \$500,000 and the building an additional five "Seasonal" cabins at a cost of \$500,000.

Over the years, Lutherlyn has been a valuable resource for Zion. Many of our congregation's former and current youth have taken advantage of the various programs offered at the camp.

Our ongoing support for sending Zion's youth to Lutherlyn has been faithfully supported through our ongoing "Kelly Jones, Lutherlyn scholarship fund". Without the generous support of Gene and Karen Jones, who began the fund in memory of Kelly and the many Zion members who continue to honor Kelly by donating to the scholarship fund, many of our young members would be unable to experience the rich resources that Lutherlyn provides.

We will be seeking guidance from the congregation on how best to respond to this appeal. Our choices are between a fund-raising campaign asking for individual contributions from the congregation or making a congregational gift to the campaign by way of a one-time donation.

We have several available fund sources to draw from if we decide on the one-time congregational gift. There is money in the Memorial Fund, the Youth Activities Fund and the Youth Gathering Fund (we have no youth who are currently age eligible to attend the 2024 event). All of these options need to receive approval by vote of the congregation so they can be used for this purpose.

We will place the issue on the agenda for our upcoming Annual Meeting which will be held on Sunday, November 19, 2023, at 5:00 PM.

Martin Luther

Beginning this fall, Zion's Worship and Music committee will be sponsoring a series of talks centering on the writings of Martin Luther.

Presented by Jim Chapman at the conclusion of our Sunday service on the second and fourth Sundays of each month, these 10 minute "talks" will provide both entertainment and education while we remember the life of one of the most dynamic leaders of the Protestant Reformation.

Green Corner NWPA Synod Green Team

Fall is an excellent time to plant trees, and it's also a good time to rescue smaller tree and shrub seedling volunteers like oaks and maples nowsprouting in various flower beds and waste areas all around us so this project can be free or very inexpensive if you plant nuts and seeds to increase the amount of vegetation around you and provide food for wildlife. Do ask homeowners before you uproot seedlings in flowerbeds other than your own. Or you can purchase seedlings or larger trees to plant. God helps us with the watering in fall and winter. If you have concerns about plants being dry, don't hesitate to get out there and water them. Always use the best soil you can, and that may mean that the soil at the surface should go into the hole with the roots. Always use something as mulch, to hold moisture in the soil while trying not to touch the little tree with mulch. I even recycle old clothes as mulch, as long as the tree is in an established garden bed, absolutely not where a lawnmower would touch the fabric. That's an instant tragedy! Mowed grass is an excellent free mulch and improves soil as well. Protect the new seedlings from chewing animals. I cage all new trees until leaves and small branches are taller than me, beyond where deer can reach. It's amazing how fast trees grow, some far more than a foot a year! Planting trees around houses can lower temperatures in the yard and in the house as well, if they are properly sited. I have whole house air conditioning but have had no need to use it for years. The trees make the difference. Do some research, looking for what conditions your seedlings will needsun or shade, dry or damp conditions. Conifer trees and shrubs on the north and northwest side of a house block cold winter winds and help to cool the area around them in summer. Deciduous summer shade trees should be planted on the west or east side of houses (mine are on the west). When the leaves fall, the sun can help heat the house in the winter. Reuse your leaves as mulch to feed the soil. Consider planting trees back far enough from houses to remove concerns of adult trees falling on houses. After living here 46 years, most of the thousands of trees I've planted are adult now. But I plant trees and nuts every year. It is a true blessing to feel the difference in air temperature and wind currents these trees make now, both in and out of the house. Please, be a blessing to God's world and plant for our future.

S&T checking balance is lower at \$4,980. Kevin has directed Bev to move some money from savings into the checking for bills. Expense for books for the Bible Study placed under Parish Ed.

IGS gas/electric. – Kevin to meet with the company to see how we can lock in some lower rates before the increase. Also doing research on bundled insurance plans for gas/electric/water lines.

Motion to approve financial report and file. (Shirley/Kim)

Administration & Finance –

Next year's budget. Should we do another request for pledges to help plan the budget. Prior budget was planned using the pledges. Our pledges have decreased, but we are still meeting our budget with income above budget. There are 12 families who are giving 66% of our budget. This year should we plan the budget on our estimated income received, or strictly from the pledge amounts? The committees are asked to submit budget requests for 2024.

Staff Support – Rik - With the upcoming budget planning be thinking about raises for staff for next year.

A question was asked if we have any estimate for expense for an intern. Rik said it would be about \$38k

A concern that there could be much more damage if we don't get rid of the bats.

ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE COMMITTEE MINUTES

August 9, 2023

Call to order: 7:18 pm

July Minutes were reviewed and approved no changes. (Rik/Kim)

July Financials:

July Current and Benevolence (\$19,458.60) is above budget by \$7,852.77. Kevin pointed out on the financial report that the donations coming in for the Organ Restoration will go into the Capital Improvement fund. The income surplus this year so far is \$25,774. Our expenses have been above budget mainly due to property expense. Motion was made to file financials for audit. (Rik/Kim)

2024 Budget Process – Kevin passed out a sample draft of the 2024 budget. This was built based on what our donations have been running on average the past two years (both years had income over budget), and not based on pledges as was done the last two years. For the 2023 year the pledges did not meet the budget so a 2022 surplus amount of \$9,353 was moved to this year to balance the budget. For the 2024 budget the difference between the expected (avg.) donations and the budgeted income will be made up with the interest earned in the CD's and the \$25,000 2023 surplus will go into the Budget Surplus O2 account.

Discussion followed about whether we should send out pledge requests this year.

Ongoing Facilities Projects-

Window - Final measurements have been done. Installation will probably move to spring 2024.

Kitchen – Kitchen is complete and bill paid. Need to wipe down all surfaces and put things back in.

Kney Organ Refurbishment – We received pledges of \$79,110 with \$16,650 received already. Grant work is still in process

Online Project – Lines run.

Old Business –

Intern project- In process. 2024 budget will have cost for intern included.

Bat removal project – 3 different bids have come in. This will be discussed at Property Committee.

Elevator - We are looking into getting an additional bid for repair.


