# Congratulations Zion on a Great 2023

Well, you all really came through in 2023!

Income for 2023 totaled **\$207,818.50**. This was \$53,021.67 **over** our budgeted income of \$154,796.83. Much of this increase came in the form of Current and Benevolence contributions which totaled **\$186,974.50**. Our Current and Benevolence contributions were \$47,704.50 **over** our pledged Current and Benevolence budget of \$139,270.00

The support you all provided toward Zion's budget in 2023 gave council the confidence to increase our budget for 2024 so that additional ministerial support and enhanced programming with Evangelism and Recreation and Fellowship can be added to our 2024 agenda. We also will be able to continue to enjoy the added voices from our IUP student scholarship program as our 2024 budget will pick up the financial requirements previously covered through the Helen Myers Memorial Fund which will now return to funding special music programming. This will provide additional opportunities for Zion to expand its ministry.

Your support throughout 2023 also allowed us to pay for several unexpected property expenses. Repairs to our elevator, roof support for our furnace room, and sidewalk repair added to our operating expenses in 2023 and were paid for with the increased support you supplied to our budget.

As we close our 2023 financial year we are blessed with a \$23,821.16 budget surplus that we will carry into 2024.

Our congregation is moving forward thanks to you.

# Zion's 2024 Pledge Campaign Continues

It is not too late to send in your Current and Benevolence pledge for 2024.

We currently have 30 pledges totaling \$107,070.00. In comparison we had 44 pledges in 2023 totaling \$139,270.00.

We have approved a more robust budget for 2024. We have expanded our ministry with the addition of Vicar Jane Miller. We have increased the budgets of both the Recreation and Fellowship and Evange-lism committee so that funds would be available for more enhanced membership and outreach programming.

As we strive to reach the level of contributions necessary to consider calling full time pastoral support, our church leadership views 2024 as a critical year toward demonstrating that our congregation is committed to support this effort.

# Social Ministry collection for Family Promise - Beyond Shelter Store

During Lent, Zion's outreach will be to help our neighbors in need at Family Promise of Indiana Co. We will be collecting non-food items to donate to Family Promise's **Beyond Shelter** store.

The Beyond Shelter store allows low income and underemployed individuals an opportunity to purchase non-food items (not usually at food pantries) at a reduced price so they can save more of their cash resources to pay their rent and utilities, aiding their ability to maintain independent living. The small fees generated help to support Family Promise of Indiana Co and their programs to help the unhoused. The shelter store is located at the Family Promise day center, and is open for those registered families who meet eligibility requirements.

# WAR AND THE CLIMATE CRISIS

"Israel's military assault on Gaza is not just a humanitarian disaster but also generating massive amounts of planet-heating emissions and exacerbating the climate crisis. The carbon emissions from Israel's bombs, tanks, fighter jets and other military activity in the first two months of the war were higher than the annual carbon footprints of 20 of the world's most climate-vulnerable nations, according to researchers in the United States and United Kingdom. That is "a really conservative estimate," says *Guardian* reporter Nina Lakhani, who reported on the new study. The report is based on new work by researchers in the U.S. and the U.K., and they say even this impact is likely an underestimate. The analysis includes carbon emissions from fuel for aircraft, tanks and other vehicles, as well as emissions from making and exploding bombs, artillery and rockets. It also showed that U.S. cargo planes flying military supplies to Israel accounted for nearly half of all the carbon emissions."

"Twelve months in, the Russian/Ukraine war's decidedly mixed carbon impact is coming into view. Inside Ukraine, experts have tracked vast amounts of the greenhouse gasses that have been shed. Outside of Ukraine, though, the opposite has happened. To many analysts' surprise, Putin's decision to squeeze gas exports to Europe last summer has pushed the region's emissions down in recent months. It has also accelerated a global phase out of fossil fuels.

But the bad climate news first. Forest fires sparked by fighting, attacks on the Nord Stream 1 and 2 gas pipelines, the need to rebuild hundreds of thousands of blasted buildings, plus the millions of fossil-fueled journeys by soldiers, munitions, and refugees, adds up to a lot of extra carbon pollution. Russia's targeting of Ukraine's energy system, starting in October, has been particularly damaging: as oil depots and gas power plants have exploded, releasing carbon and methane into the air, Ukrainians have been forced to rely on dirtier fuels to keep warm. "We saw a huge influx of inefficient [diesel-powered] generators in November and December," says Lennard de Klerk, a Dutch carbon accounting expert in Kyiv preparing a report on the war's greenhouse gas impact, due to be presented to the U.N. in June (2023).

The better news is that Europe slashed its emissions in the later part of 2022. Many climate advocates had feared that Russia's suspension of natural gas exports to the E.U. would force the bloc to use more coal, which is twice as polluting. And some countries, including Germany and the U.K., did extend the life of coal plants that were due to be shut down. But the far more dominant trend was a fall in energy use. Europeans responded to dizzyingly high gas prices by turning down their gas-powered home heating or closing down businesses that couldn't pay their energy bills. The E.U.'s non-electricity natural gas consumption has fallen 17% year-over-year since the start of the war—which translates to 117 metric tons of avoided carbon emissions, according to Lauri Myllyvirta, lead analyst at the Finland-based Centre for Research on Energy and Clean Air. "Europe's CO2 emissions overall would have been higher without the invasion and Putin's attempts at an energy war.""






### CHRISTIAN SYMBOLS FOR UKRAINIAN EASTER EGGS


Devout Ukrainian women, when beginning to decorate Easter eggs (Pysanky), make the sign of the cross and whisper, "God help me!" This is to assure that the profound religious meanings symbolized in the designs shall come to life in the people who see them on Easter morning. Here are some of the symbolic meanings:

- RIBBON or BELT either around egg or length-wise means "the endless line of eternity"
- DOTS or SMALL CIRCLES stars, constellations, or Mary's tears.
- 3. LITTLE SIEVE or NET suggest fishing for men
- 4. LITTLE BASKETS or TRIANGLES symbolizes Holy Trinity
- LADDERS suggest prayer
- ROSE or EIGHT POINTED STAR ancient symbol for Christ, and also the Ressurection of the Savior
- CROSS the four corners of the world, and also the Ressurection of the Savior
- 8. LEAF or FLOWER suggest life and growth
- 9. PINE NEEDLES suggest long life, youth, and health
- 10. FISH ancient symbol for Christ
- 11. DEER and HORSES wealth and prosperity
- 11. BIRDS fertility and fulfillment of wishes
- .> 12. GRAPEVINE "Good fruits" of the Christian life
- > 13. BUTTERFLY symbol of the resurrection
  - OTHER MOTIFS: a. ears, b. windmill, c. sun, d. rake, e. rooster's comb, f. church, g. ram's horns, h. wheat, i. spider, j. goose feet

- 6.On December 29, 2024 Jody Dumm was contacted to address our continued issues with the heating system.
  - a.Suggested that the ceiling in the cage room be insulated and dry walled (Jim will contact Ron Lukehart for a bid)
- 7. On January 2, 2024 Don Ross was in to inspect the elevator. Passed
- 8. On January 11, 2024 Steve Higgins was in on a problem with the computer in the financial office. It was decided to order a new (refurbished) computer at a cost of \$300.00.
- 9.On January 11, 2024 Steve Higgins suggested that upgrades be performed on our Shepherd's Staff program. This will be completed after the 2023 year is fully closed.
- 10. On January 11, 2024 Ken Jeuit was in to install a flood light on our new marque sign. He also replaced the sensors on our two Sixth Street entrance lights.
- 11. On January 15, 2024 Jody Dumm returned to work on the heating system. The larger radiator in the cage room was turned off. New proportionate cellunoid were installed to better regulate the temperature in the nave.
  - a.Recommendation was made to shut down the right side radiator in the financial office and to replace a leaking valve on the left side of the room
  - b.Removal of the drinking fountain was also completed
- 12. On January 16, 2024 Rik Wissinger re-negotiated our service contract with Eastern Elevator. The annual cost agreed on matched the bid we received from Right Elevator. This saves the church \$1,000.00 annually
- 13. On January 16, 2024 the committee agreed to change the Environmental Pest control visit contract from monthly to quarterly since food is no longer stored on sight.
- 14. On January 16, 2024 the committee agreed to have George Sexton remove debris from the downstairs storage room.

- 15. Window replacement project continues with final window measurements being taken in July. Installation schedule appears to be in early spring
- 16. Kney Organ refurbishment continues and is on schedule to be completed in early February.
- 17. The railing going up the Sixth Street entrance needs to be scraped and re-painted.
- 18. South Basement Wall in kitchen storage room needs to be water proofed to prevent existing mold. DeBug has provided the low bid for this at \$4,000.00.
- 19. New sidewalk and steps exiting the pastor's office needs to be completed. This will provide safer access to our new Ross Shaffer Memorial Garden. Cost \$5,500.00 (Cochrane Concrete)
- 20. Zion's Sxth Street main entrance and side wings leading to the choir loft need to be replastered. This is the final clean up phase after our water leak in this area was repaired. Cost \$16,330.00 (Crane Construction)

# **Topics Discussed:**


- 1. The committee received an update on the Kney refurbishment:
